What is a SAM? From Marcia Buchs

It has been my pleasure to serve St. Paul for the past two months as a SAM. And I thought there might be some who would like to know a little more about what being a SAM entails because being served by a SAM and serving as a SAM, I believe, is new to both your congregation and me.

SAM stands for Synodically Authorized Minister. Essentially it is the designation the ELCA Central Southern Synod of Illinois uses for its lay ministers. Each synod in the ELCA has its own title and requirements for their lay ministers, so there will be differences as one goes from one synod to another.

The synod offers a three-year program to educate potential SAMs. The pandemic moved many of the classes on-line which was nice for us that live a distance from Springfield. They offer three classes per year and each class was usually held on Saturday mornings for three hours for six weeks. Most classes required us to write papers/sermons and one class required tests. Subjects included Lutheran Confessions, preaching (2), worship, ethics, church history, Old and New Testaments, and pastoral care. Once the course is completed SAMs are expected to engage in continuing education. I finished my course with 11 others last November.

SAMs are allowed to preside at worship and sacraments when authorized by the bishop to do so at specific churches on specific days. So for instance, my contract with St. Paul and St. Petri has been signed by the bishop and authorizes me to preside at worship and the sacraments for the next six months at both churches. When I preside at other churches I receive an individual letter from the bishop for each of those services. You will notice that while I wear an alb and a cross, I do not wear a collar or a stole. The collar and stole are reserved for ordained pastors in the Lutheran Church. And please just address me as Marcia as the title "pastor" is reserved for the ordained as well.

There is an application process that Pr. Ken Tegtmeier can help parties interested in becoming a SAM to complete. His email address is kft6582@gmail.com. I would be happy to talk to anyone interested in the program to answer specific questions about my experience.

The Second Article on Redemption

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suf-fered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. One of the hardest things for us to grasp is the concept of GRACE. That our redemption does not come from something we do or something we believe in but by an action of the triune God. Jesus alone set us free from the power of sin in our lives. A story is told of Martin Luther; Looking at all his sins and confronted by accusation of the devil of the great a terrible nature of those sins, and his unworthiness to stand before God. Luther found relief only in the fact that the death of Jesus Christ paid for all those sins and the grace of God freed him from the power of the lies that the devil told him about himself. Christ's redemption also frees us from the power of the devil and the lies he tells us about ourselves, our neighbors, and yes even the lie about a God who we think can't wait to punish us. But if redemption frees from sin, death, and the power of the devil. Christ's redemption then frees for something. We are free to have life based on Zadik (Hebrew for righteousness).

A professor of mine told a story of going to Israel and on a taxi ride the car broke down. The driver hopped out of the car, fiddled under the hood, and the car started right up, to which the driver yelled Zadik or righteous. It meant it worked. God's Zadik Works, it alone frees us from Sin, Death, and the Devil. God's Zadik gives us life to live in His Kingdom to experience what it truly means to blessed and innocent and Zadik. When we confess this creed week after week, the redeemed self finds life. This new life is not purchased with gold or silver but with Christ's holy, precious blood with His innocent suffering and death so you can live under Him in his kingdom. This is my definition of GRACE {God's Free, Overwhelming, Overflowing, Super Abundant Lavish Amount of Love for us humans who do not deserve it, and cannot earn it, but Christ gives it anyway.}
