LUTHER ON PROTECTING AND NOT DESTROYING OUR NEIGHBOR

The Fifth Commandment: You shall not murder. What is this? OR What does

this mean?



We are to fear and love God, so that we neither endanger nor harm the lives of our neighbors, but instead help and support them in all of life's needs.

The Eighth Commandment You shall not bear

false witness against your neighbor. What is What does this mean? We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray, or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead, we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light. Long before Fred Roger came a long, Luther saw in the commandments a call from God to find ways to live with our neighbors (neighbors being all of humanity). In the 5th and 8th commandments Luther heard a clarion call not only to not harm our neighbor but to protect our neighbor's life and name. In the Fifth commandment Luther calls us back to Luke 10:29 when Jesus is asked "Who then is my neighbor?" Jesus' answer comes in Luke 10:36 "Who was neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers? Jesus and the 5 th commandment change the question from "who is my Neighbor?", to "what kind of neighbor am I?" The clarion call Luther points us to is that we are not to be neighbors who endanger or harm our neighbors

(humanity) in any way. There is a show on TV called "Neighborhood Wars". The main issue seems to be that one neighbor or person has done some great wrong to another neighbor so that words and action leads to verbal and physical assault even to the point of death. Luther says God is calling us in our Fear (awe) and love of God to do everything to avoid endangering or harming them. However, Luther tells us it is not enough to just simply not do something but calls us to actions that lead us to help and support our neighbor (humanity) in all their life's needs. The Eighth commandments also ask "what kind of neighbor am I when it comes to our neighbor's name. Names are the core of our identity. When we lie betray or slander our neighbor, we destroy their identity and make their name "vain", remember to make something vain is to make it nothing. However again Luther says in this commandment God is calling for more from us than just not destroying our neighbors name and reputation a kind of death, but to speak well of them defend them and see them in the kindest possible light. The sinful self, the devil, and the world will say this is Namby-Pamby stuff after all it is my life that is important it is my life and identity that I need



to protect. But God keep asking us this one question, "What kind of neighbor are you?
